Report of death of Earl E. Thompson, Pvt., #4252473.

1. The Commanding Officer of the U.S.S. Leviathan reported the death of soldier said to be EARL E. Thompson; organization, serial number and emergency address unknown. Under date of November 14th, 1918, this office transmitted this information to the Adjutant General as per enclosed copy of telegram.
2. The Emergency Address of Earl Thompson was received from the Embarkation files as Charles Thompson, R.R. 17, Windsor, Mo. On November 14th Mr. Thompson was notified of the death of Earl Thompson as per copy of enclosed telegram.
3. On rechecking the list submitted by the Leviathan the following notation was found "Earl Thompson, tag No. 4252473." On investigation of the Embarkation files it was found that this number corresponded to Ezra E. Thompson, Co. I, 57th Pioneer Inf.; Emergency Address, Mrs. Alice Thompson (Mother), Eversburg, Tenn. This address has not been notified.
4. It is impossible for this office to determine whether the soldier in question is Earl E. Thompson, whose proper Serial no. is 2002733, with the Emergency Address first above given, or Ezra E. Thompson, Serial No. 4252473 with the latter Emergency Address.
5. This communication contains all the information in the possession of this office and is the only confirmation which we are able to give of our telegrams.

MEMORANDUM FOR: Major Nelson.

1. On or about the 14th of November, 1918, the U.S.S. Leviathan reported to this office the deaths of 91 enlisted men. The information given was very meagre, and in many cases erroneous. Work on this list soon showed us that not only were names misspelled, and the serial numbers given incorrectly in many cases.

2. Amongst the names reported to us on Page 19 of their report is the following:

Name:	<u>Earl Thompson</u> , Tag.No.4252473
Time of death:	11:55 p.m. 8Oct18.
Cause of death:	Pneumonia, Lobar
Origin of disease:	In line of duty; not due to his own misconduct.
Next of kin:	#
Disposition of remains:	Delivered to Army Authorities, Port of Debarkation. "

3. This office not having the name of the next of kin requested the Embarkation Files to furnish us the name of the next of kin of Earl Thompson who sailed on the Leviathan. Information was returned to us that the name of the next of kin of Earl Thompson was Mr. Charles Thompson of Windsor, Mo.

4. This office has been designated by the Chief of Staff to inform the next of kin of deaths of soldiers dying on board ships immediately upon receipt of such information by ourselves. Pursuant to these instructions we therefore following the advice of the Embarkation Files that Mr. Charles Thompson was the next of kin, notified him of the death of Earl Thompson on November 14th.

5. As previously stated we have found the serial numbers given by the Commanding Officer of the Leviathan to be inaccurate and unreliable. The fact therefore that the serial number of Earl Thompson as reported to us by the Commanding Officer of the Leviathan did not check with the number given in the passenger list was not at the time considered to have much importance. Later on in connection with other cases we examined the entire passenger list of the Leviathan, and it then developed that there were several other Thompsons on board, including one Ezra Thompson. It further developed that Ezra Thompson had the serial number reported to have been that of Earl Thompson as explained in our letter to the Commanding General dated November 19th. Immediately upon the discovery of this fact the report above referred to was forwarded to the Commanding General.

6. No further steps were taken in this matter for the reason that we had no means of determining whether it was Earl Thompson or Ezra Thompson that died. We did not wish to take the step advised in the 1st Indorsement of recalling our telegram to Earl Thompson's next of kin, and advising Ezra Thompson's next of kin of the death, because if it was later discovered that an error was made it would only mean opening up the wound again advising Earl Thompson's next of kin that we were wrong after all and that their son had really died, and recalling our telegram from the next of kin of Ezra Thompson. It was considered best judgment to allow the matter to stay as it was until it was definitely determined whether it was Earl Thompson or Ezra Thompson that had died.

7. Conversation with the Port Adjutant, Major Robins, took place and the whole situation was thoroughly gone into on or about November 19th, and he made the suggestion that this report be forwarded immediately to The Adjutant General with the request that he take the matter up by cable with the Expeditionary Forces to ascertain which of the Thompsons it was that had died and notify the next of kin. Nothing further was heard of this matter until Wednesday when one of the field clerks from the Embarkation files came down to this office with our letter and asked me which one I believed it was that died. I told him that I was unable to advise him as it was impossible for this office to determine, but I said that I believed in view of the fact that the number was correctly reported that it was probably Ezra Thompson. It is my recollection that the field clerk then stated that he thought that was correct, and would so report.

8. Yesterday afternoon we received the 1st indorsement above referred to. I have therefore written the letters of notification as instructed in the 2nd paragraph, which are enclosed herewith.

Hq. Port of Embarkation, Hoboken, N.J., December 10, 1918. To The Adjutant General of the Army, Washington, D.C., inviting consideration of above letter and indorsements relative to identity of one Thompson who died on October 8, 1918, on S. S. "LEVIATHAN" enroute to France.

1. The report from S. S. "LEVIATHAN" gave name of soldier as Earl E. Thompson, organization and serial number unknown. The Effects Quartermaster, this Port, obtained emergency address and notified nearest relative of death of Earl Thompson. Later information of serial number (4252473) indicated body was that of Ezra B. Thompson, Co. "I", 57th Infantry.

2. Paragraph 6 of second indorsement is explanatory of a doubt which still exists as to which of the two soldiers died on the S. S. "LEVIATHAN". It is recommended that the matter be cleared up by cabling to Commanding General, American Expeditionary Forces, inquiring if death on S. S. "LEVIATHAN", October 8, 1918, was that of Private Ezra B. Thompson (4252473), Co. "I", 57th Infantry.

3. The inclosed letters to next of kin of these two soldiers have been prepared and signed, but are held for decision of this case. It is requested that they be mailed from your office in event that inquiry proves Ezra B. Thompson to be the soldier who died and that this office be notified of action taken.

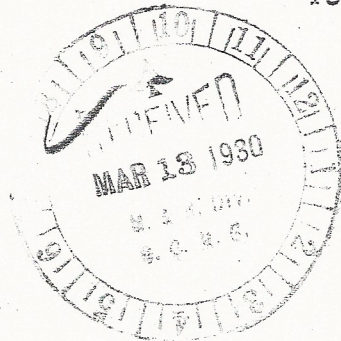

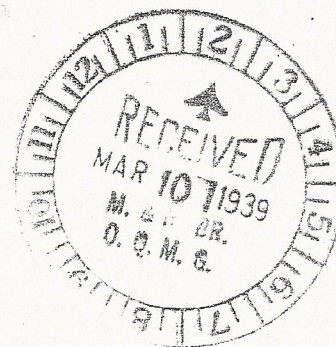

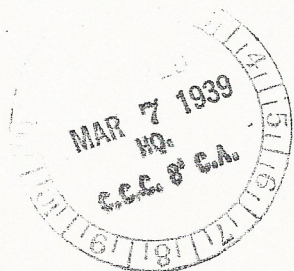
